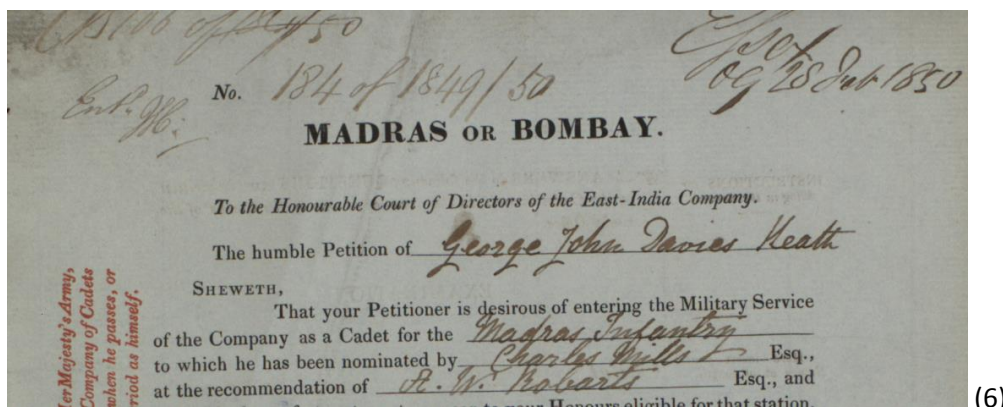
Introduction

With her rather forlorn and forsaken gaze, Miss Henrietta Heath “unknown” seemed to be quietly asking to be made “known”. Thanks to the great clues left on the back of the photo, she has been. The research details and documents used to prove her identity are presented in “Finding Miss Heath” (4). Having found her, this paper now hopes to shake out the mothballs and bring fresh air back to her life story, 130 years after her death.

Elusive Parents

Of course, it started out not easy. No birth registration was found but Elizabeth Henrietta’s marriage entry provided the first clues to her parentage. Her father was “George Heath, Clerk in Holy Orders” (3) (see “1873” section). Her brother, George John Davies Heath, was discovered when she was mentioned in his probate record (5) (see “Illustrious Relations” section) and it was his 1850 Military Cadet Application papers (6) that let us know that her mother’s name was Henrietta. (6 pp. 12,14)

These Cadet Papers also provided more clues about the family. Their father, George, was a Reverend (6 p. 12) and had been the head of a school called “St Pauls” (6 p. 2). We also now know that their father was deceased (6 p. 2) and their mother alive and living at No. 8 Ladbroke Place East, Notting Hill on 25th July 1850. (6 p. 14)

This seemed to be the end of the family's trail but a closer look at George John Davies Heath's Probate record (5) opened up a crack in the wall.

Illustrious Relations

We later see that Elizabeth Henrietta was most likely born in 1825 in Bloomsbury, London (see "1823.1815" section). Her parents, George & Henrietta, might have been staying with or near some very rich and eminent relatives. The executors of Elizabeth Henrietta's brother George's will were Alfred Hales Heath and Henry Burnley Heath. Who were they?

HEATH George John Davies.

Fortunately, Alfred Hales Heath also had a military application record with a very scruffy extract from his birth register records (7).

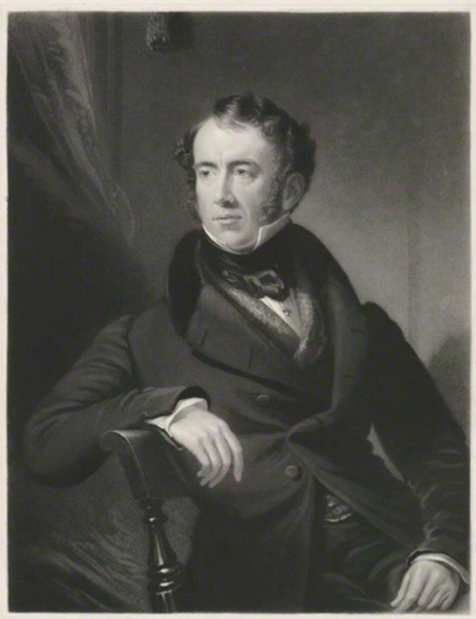

Amongst the scribble you can see that Alfred Hales Heath was also born in the same year as Elizabeth Henrietta Heath, 1825, and also in Bloomsbury, London. The bells started ringing! His parents were John Benjamin & Sophia Heath. Perhaps John Benjamin and the Rev. George were brothers. An illustrious connection indeed. Just look at who John Benjamin was!

The application shows that he was the Sardinian Consul General in 1825 and in 1843 at the time of the application he was the Deputy Governor of the Bank of England, 66 Russel Square.

The following online biography confirms that he was a big-wig indeed!

“Heath, John Benjamin, 1st Baron (1790 -1879)

John Benjamin Heath was the son of John Heath, merchant of Genoa, and a grandson of Benjamin Heath the great book collector. He was educated at Harrow School, where he is said to have fagged for Lord Byron. A merchant and foreign banker in London, he also served as Consul General for the Kingdom of Sardinia 1817 1861, and for the Kingdom of Italy 1861 1879. He was Director of the Bank of England 1823 1872, Deputy Governor 1843 1844, Governor 1846 1847, and Master of the Grocer's Company. He was created Baron Heath of the Kingdom of Italy 26 May 1867. He was elected a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries in 1832, and a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1843. His collection of autographs was sold by Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge, 24 April 1879, and part of the family library in the sale of part of the library of Amédée John Heath, Baron Heath by Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge 7 November 1892.” (8) <https://goo.gl/gO3STB>

I can see a bit of a family resemblance to Elizabeth Henrietta. What do you think? So how were they connected?

It had been worthwhile chipping away at this crack in the wall as the dam burst open when I found all of the Heaths mentioned so far on an ancestry.com tree owned by Caroline Ainscough (10). Thanks to a wonderful friend and ancestry.com subscriber, Sandra Daws, who acted as a go-between I was able to contact Caroline and she immediately sent me a link to her tree details & source ... and what a treasure trove that was.

Caroline's source was a book that's now available online “Heathiana: notes, genealogical and biographical, of the family of Heath” by William Richard Drake published 1881 (11). <https://goo.gl/S4GerT>

It certainly provided a flood of information on Elizabeth Henrietta & George John Davies' family. In trying to find the connection between their father, the Rev. George Heath, and John Benjamin Heath, I had been swimming in the wrong creek! John Benjamin wasn't a brother of the Rev. George Heath, he was a brother to their mother, Henrietta, who was also a Heath at birth! The picture is now clear. Elizabeth Henrietta's grandfathers were brothers.

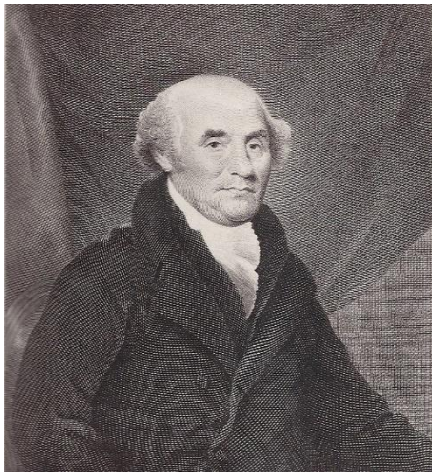
Grandfather Rear-Admiral William Heath

Her paternal grandfather was Rear-Admiral William Heath 1748-1815 (11 p. 21) of whom I'm sure there is much information available for anyone interested to search (not me!). What is interesting to note for later, however, is that he lived on an Estate he had purchased

at Fahan, near Londonderry, Ireland. He died there in 1815 (11 p. 19).

WILLIAM HEATH, the third surviving son of Benjamin Heath and Rose Mary Michelet, was born on the 18th September, 1748,* entered the Royal Navy at a very early age, and attained the rank of Rear-Admiral. In 1789, he lived (as we learn from his brother John's note book) on an Estate he had purchased at Fahan, near Londonderry. He died at Fahan House, 11th June, 1815, at the age of 65 years, having twice married;† firstly in 1786, at Fahan old Church, to REBECCA, second daughter of the Rev. Josiah MARSHALL, the Rector of Fahan. She was born at Fahan Rectory, 20th January, 1765, and died at Fahan House, 23rd August, 1796. She was buried (as was also her husband) in a vault in the old graveyard at Fahan, leaving issue, three sons and two daughters. *Tabular Pedigree* A (Appendix, p. xiii). See also an Account by Miss Angel Heath of her father (Appendix, p. v.)—Admiral Heath married, secondly, ELIZABETH SCHOALES, who died and was buried at Fahan in 1832, but by her he had no issue.

Grandfather John Heath, the Merchant of Genova

Her maternal grandfather was John Heath 1749-1830, a Genova merchant who returned with his family to England in 1798, established the mercantile house of "Heath & Co." and resided at 22 Queen Street, Bloomsbury which he purchased in 1800 and where he died in 1830 (11 pp. 19,20). His daughter, Henrietta may very well have given birth to Elizabeth Henrietta in this house in 1825 and, according to Caroline Ainscough (10), that is what she read in an appended chart in "Heathiana" which is partly missing in the online copy. (She has seen an original copy of the book)

Well, that's as far as I'm going to swim within the Heath history. I think it's suffice to conclude that the "unknown" Elizabeth Henrietta Heath, was born into a very illustrious family indeed!

In the year 1798, John Heath left Genoa and returned with his family to England, he established himself in London, where, in Great Winchester Street, he founded the mercantile house of "Heath & Co.," and resided at a house, 22, Queen Square, Bloomsbury, which he purchased in 1800, and where he died, 16th January, 1830.

By his wife, Jane Louisa Pasteur, he had five children, two sons and three daughters, viz. :—

- I. JOHN BENJAMIN HEATH, before mentioned, and of whom hereafter.
- II. JOHN CHARLES HEATH, born 9th and died at Genoa 26th November, 1796†.
 1. MARIA LOUISA, born at Genoa 20th November, 1794,† who married there, 6th June, 1815, ANDRE DE LA RUE, whom she survived, and died at Paris 30th August, 1868, at the age of 74 years, leaving issue, a daughter married to Baron ADOLPHE D'EICHTHAL. *Tabular Pedigree* E (Appendix, p. xvii).
 2. **HENRIETTA** born at Walkerne 21st October, 1798†, who married October 1818, her first cousin, THE REV. GEORGE HEATH, son of Admiral William Heath. He died in London 23rd April, 1847, and was buried in Old St. Pancras Churchyard. She died at Brighton 6th February, 1863, and was buried there, leaving issue. *Tabular Pedigree*, A (Appendix, p. xiii).

Parents Found

From "Heathiana" we now know that Elizabeth Henrietta's mother, Henrietta Heath, was born at Walkerne (Walkern), 21 Oct 1798 (a twin) and married her first cousin the Rev. George Heath, Oct 1818. The Rev. died in 1847, three years before his son's military application, and Henrietta died in Brighton, 6 Feb 1863 ... which was, incidentally, this very day exactly 153 years ago! (11 pp. 20,21)

1818 Berkshire, Sutton Courtenay: Parents Marry

A transcript from findmypast (12) shows that they married on 9 Nov 1818 in Sutton Courtenay where we later see that they had two children. The second arrived in 1821.

This baptism transcript (13) looks very likely to be the first born child after the 1818 marriage. He was born in 1819 and baptised on 16 Jun 1821 along with the next child.

This baptism transcript for Jane Louisa Heath, who was born in 1821, has the same parents, George Heath & Henrietta Heath, and she was baptised on 16 Jun 1821 in Sutton Courtenay, Berkshire, the same place & day as William (14).

1823, 1825 London, Bloomsbury: Birth of Elizabeth Henrietta

That's when the baptism paper trail ended and guess-work kicked in. Next was probably the birth of Elizabeth Henrietta, most likely in 1825 (15) (16) (17) (18) in Bloomsbury (16), London. According to Caroline Ainscough (10), Elizabeth Henrietta was born 22 Dec 1823 at 22 Queen Square London which was the address of her maternal grandfather, John Heath, The Merchant of Genova. (If transcribed from old text, perhaps the 5 was misinterpreted as a 3.)



Granddad's place must have been quite something. "Queen Square is a garden square in the Bloomsbury district of central London." (19) This illustration, "Queen Square in 1810" by Edward Walford gives a pretty grandiose impression. John Heath bought number 22 in 1800 so perhaps that's him there taking a stroll! (20)

1827 Ireland, Donegal, Fahan: Birth of Sister, Mary Ann Hawkshaw

Not wanting the paternal grandfather, Rear-Admiral William Heath, to feel left-out, the next child seems to have been born at his home. According to Caroline Ainscough (10), Mary Ann Hawkshaw, was born 30 Aug 1827 in Fahan, Donegal, Ireland which is where the Admiral had an Estate. This was also the birthplace of her father, George Heath, who was born in Fahan, Donegal, Ireland on 3 Jan 1793 (10).

So what was Grandpa William's place like? Who would have thought it possible to find out via a published account of one man's tour of observation and soil research through the country of Antrim to the North-West District? On his tour, Mr Atkinson visited "the residence of that respectable lady, Mrs Heath of Fahan" (21) and besides, describing her (and later comparing her to soil!), also gives a brief description of her home and property. I think there's a possibility that this is Grandpa William's place. He had died there in 1815 but his second wife lived on at Fahan until her death in 1832 (11 p. 19). The account was published in 1833 but as the tour must have happened before this, then I think it's possible that he was visiting Mrs Elizabeth Heath.

He describes the property as standing "on a level with Lough Swilly, and comprising a plain but convenient old mansion-house in the style of a century or two backwards, together with 32 acres

of a demesne, by no means very ornamentally planted, situated on the eastern shore of the lough, with the Inch mountain rising out of that water in the front view.” (21)

And here’s what he saw: Lough Swilly with the Inch Mountain in the background taken near Fahan. Rather the opposite to Grandpa George’s place. I think the grandchildren would have had the best of both worlds. I can imagine they could let their hair down here, frolic about in the lough, go sailing, and laze-about in the old mansion house.

MRS. HEATH OF FAHAN.

In the same neighbourhood we visited the residence of that respectable lady, Mrs. Heath of **FAHAN**, (pronounced **FAWHAN** by the people of the country,) a word, we presume, intended to designate a town-land, or some similarly small canton; as it is the name universally given to the district of the bishop’s palace; and we know not upon what principle the whole neighbourhood of that building should be thus designated, unless **Fahan** be the ancient name of the parish, or of the town-land upon which the palace stands.

This seat of Mrs. Heath stands on a level with Lough Swilly, and comprises a plain but convenient old mansion-

house, in the style of a century or two backwards, together with 32 acres of a demesne, by no means very ornamentally planted, situated on the eastern shore of the lough, with the Inch mountain rising out of that water in the front view.

Although Heath is the lady’s name that owns this place, there is no manner of connection between her name and her soil, or between her name and her character; for these are not barren and unfruitful, like “the heath in the desert that knoweth not when good cometh.”

Derry is the post-town to this place.

1832 Ireland, Antrim: Birth of Brother, George John Davies Heath

Not sure if the family stayed in Ireland for a few years or where just visiting again 5 years later when George John Davies Heath was born 8 Apr 1832 (6 p. 12). The record says "County Antrim, Ireland". Perhaps they were on the way to Grandpa William's!

1834 Channel Islands, Guernsey: Baptism of Brother, George John Davies Heath

The family were in the Parish of St. Peter-Port, Guernsey, where George John Davies Heath was baptised on 14 Feb 1834 (6 p. 12). Hi sister, Mary Ann Hawkshaw would later marry a Jersey Vicar and move to the Channel Islands.

1841 Devon, Devonport, Stoke Damerel: The Heath Family Altogether, Almost!

Next we find them in Devon. I am almost certain that this 1841 census record (23) is for Elizabeth Henrietta and her family. George's profession matches as do all the names and places of birth except for Henrietta who is recorded as born in Ireland, the same as her husband. We now know that she was born in Hertfordshire!

The eldest, William, is missing. He would have been about 22 in 1841 and according to Caroline Ainscough (10), he moved to Australia. Perhaps he was already there by 1841!

Jane Louisa would have been 20 in 1841, possibly 19 at the time of the census. The 1841 census record gives her age as 15 but anyone over the age of 15 was rounded down to the next 5 so this could match. The same for the parents.

The younger children's ages, however, are all over the place! If Elizabeth Henrietta was born in 1825 then she would have been about 15 in 1841 and here she is listed as 13. Her brother George should have been 9 but is listed here as 5.

This is, however, the only census record that shows almost all the family together.

This census gives their address as St Michael Terrace, Stoke Damerel, Devon, where George was working in the Clergy. As we saw from his son's military application, George was the head of St Paul's school before his death (6 p. 2). Trying to find where that school might be is a needle in a haystack situation but, as George died in 1847, it seemed possible that the 1841 census might be showing his last residence so the school might be there. Then came this tantalising bit of information: "St Paul's parish was formed in 1846, out of the mother parish of Stoke Damerel" (24). A long shot but possible!

Searching for the St Michael's Terrace address brought up a very interesting match. It's from a notice for "The Court Relief of Insolvent Debtors" giving the times that the "prisoners ... are appointed to be heard at the Court-House" (25). Look who is on the list to appear on 18th March 1830. No, not our George but it looks like it could be the previous tenant.

On Thursday the 18th day of March 1830,

Jacob, the Reverend John, formerly of Greenwich, Kent, Assistant in a School, afterwards of Saint Aubyn-Street, Devonport, and late of No. 7, Saint Michael's-Terrace, both in the Parish of Stoke Damerel, Devonshire, Clerk, Doctor of Laws, Surrogate of Stoke Damerel, and School-master.

It could be that No.7 St Michael's Terrace was the home provided by the church for the Stoke Damerel parish clerk and school-master and was, therefore, also the Heath family's home for a while. Let's hope that this previous tenant, poor Rev. John Jacob, got out of his spot of financial bother.

1841 Channel Islands, Jersey: The Ingle Family

In the meantime, Elizabeth Henrietta's future husband, Lionel and his family were living in St Peter, Jersey (26). I wonder if they were still living there in 1848. Read on to find out why!

1842 London, St. Pancras: Death of Sister, Jane Louisa

There is a death record transcript for a Jane Louisa Heath who died in 1842 in St. Pancras London (27). I think it is likely that this is Elizabeth Henrietta's older sister as the death district is the same as that of her father's who died 5 years later.

Jane Louisa was only 21 years old. There was a Typhus epidemic in London in 1842. 16,201 died. I wonder if Jane Louisa was one of its victims (28).

1847 London, St. Pancras: Death of Father, The Rev. George Heath

We know for sure that this Saint Pancras burial record for 30 Apr 1847 (29) is the right one because it matches the "Heathiana" information and "The Index to Death Duty Registers 1796-1903" which reads: "Testator: Heath, The Rev. George; Residence: 37 Benton Crescent; Executors: J.M. Heath [residing at] the same place." (30)

J.M. Heath is likely to be Josiah Marshall Heath 1792-1851, who was George's brother. George was only 53 years old and yes, there was another Typhus epidemic in 1847 (location not specified). 30,320 died!

"Burton Crescent was renamed Cartwright Gardens" (31) so this image of 36 Cartwright Gardens today seems to match the array of impressive places in which the family lived ... and died.

1848 Channel Islands, Jersey: Sister, Mary Ann Hawkshaw, Marries

Mary Ann Hawkshaw seems to have married a bit of a father figure. Her husband, the Rev. John Charles Frederick Vincent, was also in the clergy and he was 10 years her senior. She was 21. Rev. John was born in Jersey, Channel Islands, where they are likely to have married around 1848 as their first 2 children were also born in Jersey in 1849 and 1850. They were still there for the 1851 census (10).

Now you might remember that Elizabeth Henrietta's future husband was living in Jersey at the time of the 1841 census. If they were still there in 1848 then perhaps both he and Elizabeth attended and met at this wedding! They would both have been 23 years old.

1850 East Indies: Brother Joins the Madras Infantry

George John Davies was stationed in The East Indies in 1850 and married Mary Susan Lennard Broun on 29 Aug 1855 in Singapore, my great-great grandaunt. Their story can be read in "The Broun Memsahibs" coming soon! (33).

1851 Norfolk, Downham, Hilgay: Romance at "Wood Hall"

By 1851, Elizabeth Henrietta's father had died; her sister Jane Louisa probably too; her brother William was likely to already be in Australia; Mary Ann Hawkshaw was in Jersey, Channel Islands; and George John Davies was in the East Indies.

That just left Elizabeth Henrietta who one might expect would be found at home with her mother but she was not. She was off visiting at "Wood Hall", Hilgay, Downham, Norfolk. And whose family should it be but that of her future husband. Her future father in law, Thomas Ingle's profession is given as "Physician in practice", matching the photo information. This must have been quite a lucrative position as they had six servants. This record conveniently shows that she did sometimes use the name "Henrietta", the same as on the photo inscription. Lionel, who is the same age as Elizabeth Henrietta, is also listed as a Physician but this is the only time I saw him given this profession in any record (15).

Besides the possibility of a budding romance, or at least a firm friendship, I could well imagine the attraction of visiting Wood Hall Manor when I saw this photo. Wood Hall Manor warranted a mention in Wikipedia because it was the birthplace of Thomas Moore Manby who had lots of battle & nautical achievements but whose most interesting claim to fame, I thought, was that he was "the chief suspect in the "delicate investigation" into the morals of Caroline, Princess of Wales." (34)!

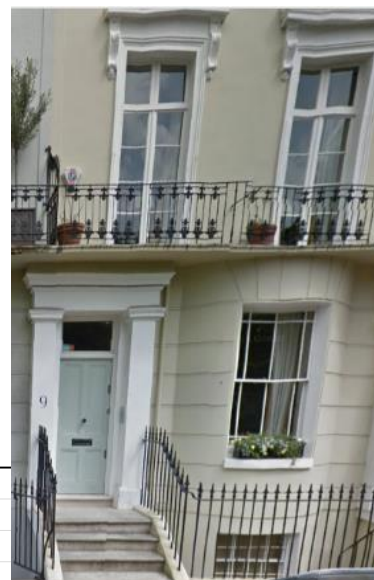

So what about Elizabeth Henrietta's mother? We find her listed as a 52 year old widow, born about 1799 in Walkerne, Hertfordshire and living alone at 9 Norland Square, Kensington, Middlesex. She's living off her funds (35). The last address we had for her was in 1850 at 8 Ladbrooke Place East (6) which is an 8 minute walk away from 9 Norland Square.

9 Norland Square, is still standing today (google maps). Perhaps Elizabeth Henrietta also lived here with her mother in 1851. At the very least she stood on these steps in her billowing crinolines at some time or other.

1861 Hampshire, Havant, Warblington: The Ingle Family Move to Warblington

Elizabeth Henrietta is again visiting with the Ingle family at the time of the 1861 census. They have, however moved from stately "Wood Hall Manor" to "The Villetta" at 12 Havant Road, Warblington, Havant, Hampshire. Dr Thomas Ingle has retired as his profession is given as "Dr. of Medicine, not practicing". The family have downgraded to four servants and seem to have settled in this seaside town (16).

I couldn't find Elizabeth Henrietta's mother in the 1861 census even though she should be somewhere as she didn't die until 1863.

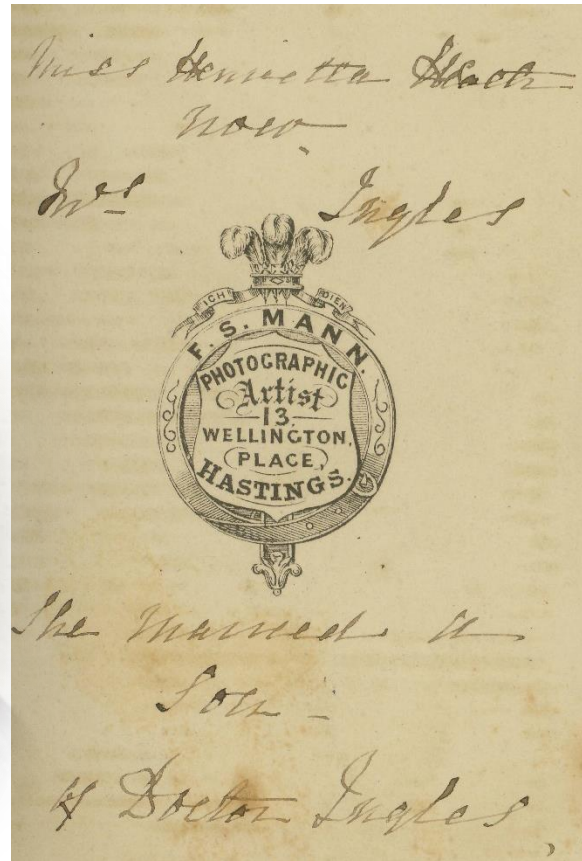
1863 East Sussex, Brighton: Death of mother, Henrietta Heath

It was not in any fancy address in London that Elizabeth's mother, Henrietta, died, but in Brighton on 6 Feb 1863 at the age of 64 (11 p. 21) (36). She might have moved again or perhaps she was having a holiday by the seaside.

1865 East Sussex, Hastings: The Photo



The trade stamp on the back of the photo proved to be an incredible help in dating the picture.

An excellent site called "Sussex Photo History" has posted the same trade stamp image and very conveniently states that this is "The trade plate of Frederick Stephen Mann, Photographic Artist of 13 Wellington Place, Hastings. This design was used on the reverse of Mann's carte-de-visite photographs in the mid-1860s." In the 1870's the trade plate was brown (37).

This would date the photo to before she was married which is confirmed by the inscription. If it was taken about 1865 she would have been about 40 years old. As "mid-1860s" could be between 1863 and 1867, I am wondering if the photo could have been taken around the time of her mother's death. Hastings, another seaside town is about 1 ¼ hours East of Brighton. This might really explain why she has such a forlorn expression.

"Sussex Photo History" has a great online collection of other Victorian photos taken in the same studio and they have asked for more so I'll be sending them a copy of Elizabeth Henrietta. Perhaps you can see her there! <http://www.photohistory-sussex.co.uk/HasPhotgrsMann.htm>

Explaining how the photo came to be included in the Broun, Sewell, Parker Photo Album is more difficult. One possibility is that Elizabeth Henrietta sent the photo to her brother, George John Davies, because it was handed down through his wife's family. She was Mary Susan Lennard Broun. (33) However, Robert Atkins assumed that "all of these images come from James William [who was Mary Susan Lennard's brother] ... If that is the case then James' mother could be the source" (1). That would be Caroline Broun (nee Simpson) 1807-1881. She would only have been the mother-in law of Elizabeth Henrietta's brother but they may have known each other as Caroline did live in London, Paddington towards the time of her death in 1888. Caroline's father was also a doctor. Whoever wrote it did so after 1873 and before 1886 which would support the "Caroline" theory as does the fact that the scribe addresses her more as an acquaintance rather than a relative. A long-shot!

1871 Lancashire, West Derby: Visiting the Deane Family

During the 1871 census, Elizabeth Henrietta was having a break from the Ingle Family and visited the Deanes at "Sandy Mount", Blundell Sands, Great Crosby, West Derby, Lancashire. A family with three servants. Not sure if this is a correct match but it was the only "Elizabeth Heath" of the right age who was not married that I could find. Her birth place differs but could just be a lazy census taker just writing "ditto" under the entry above. Elizabeth Henrietta has lost both parents by this stage and this Elizabeth is living off dividends (17).

What's Lionel up to in the meantime? At home again with his retired parents. The three of them have three servants. They are still in Havant Road, Warblington but at "Seaford House" (There is a possibility that it's the same house but a different name.) What's new information is that Lionel's occupation is now given as "Retired Military Officer" and that he's become a few years younger (38). He should have been 46 in 1871.

1873 Longdon, Staffordshire: Finally Married and Almost 50!

Perhaps because she was visiting elsewhere during the 1871 census, absence might have made the heart grow fonder so Lionel seems to have finally popped the question.



They married 12 May 1873 at the Anglican St James Parish Church in Longdon in the County of Stafford:

"Lionel Ingle age 48, bachelor, gentleman residing in Warblington, son of Thomas Ingle, Physician to Elizabeth Henrietta Heath, full age, spinster residing in Longden, daughter of George Heath, Clerk in Holy Orders." (3)

Although Elizabeth Henrietta's age has been perhaps modestly left out, they would both have been 48 years old.

As Elizabeth Henrietta was always visiting during each census it was not clear where she actually lived. Suddenly Longdon, Staffordshire pops-up as her address in 1873. A closer look at the Vicar and it becomes clear that she might still have been "just visiting", or she was living with her sister.

The vicar, "J.C.F. Vincent", has to be her brother in law, Rev. John Charles Frederick Vincent from Jersey. The witness, "M.A. Vincent", is probably her sister Mary Anne. Sure enough, they have been living in Longdon since at least the 1861 census. In fact J.F.C. is the "Vicar of Longdon" and they are living at the vicarage. They are still there for the 1871 census along with a lot of boarders, all boys. (39) (40)

When I saw in the 1871 census that Lionel was a retired military officer at the age of 46, I hoped that he hadn't been invalided and just needed an unpaid nurse. However, I'm more inclined to go with the more romantic notion that this was a very long friendship that grew to love.

1880, 1881 Hampshire, Havant, Warblington

It seems that after their marriage the couple settled in Warblington where Lionel's parents were living. Elizabeth Henrietta's brother's will gives her address as East-Road, Havant, County Southampton on 18 October 1880 (5) and they are still in Warblington for the 1881 census where they are living at "Warblington Villa" as lodgers (18)

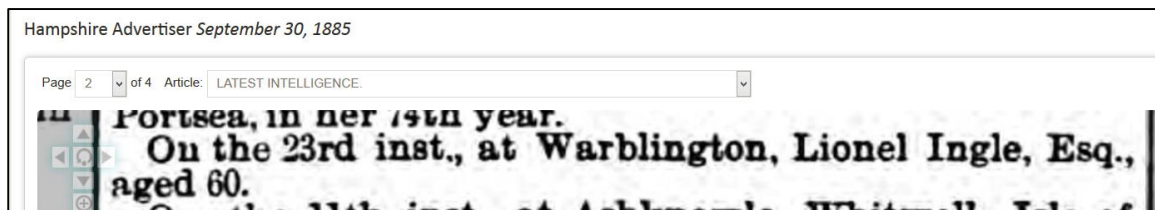

A glimpse of Warblington in the mid 1800's can be had with this 1856 etching of the local church & castle turret(2). "Pevsner (1967) describes the church of St Thomas as essentially late 12th century and praises the "undisturbed" setting. To the north of the church is the locality's most distinctive landmark: the tall octagonal turret of Warblington Castle. In October 1551, Mary of Guise the widow of James V of Scotland stayed a night in the castle as a guest of Sir Richard Cotton.^[3]" (41)

1885 Hampshire, Havant, Warblington: Death of Lionel Ingle

At age 60 Elizabeth Henrietta becomes a widow when her husband Lionel dies on 23 Sept age 60 in Warblington, Havant, Hampshire. The London Evening Standard elaborates slightly on this brief notice by saying “after a lingering illness”. (42) (I hope that doesn’t support the less romantic “need a nurse” theory!)

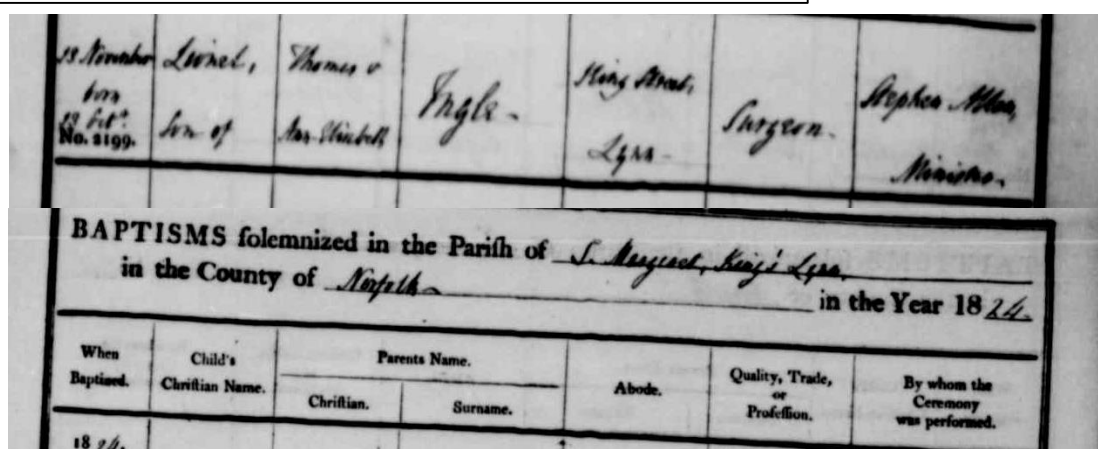

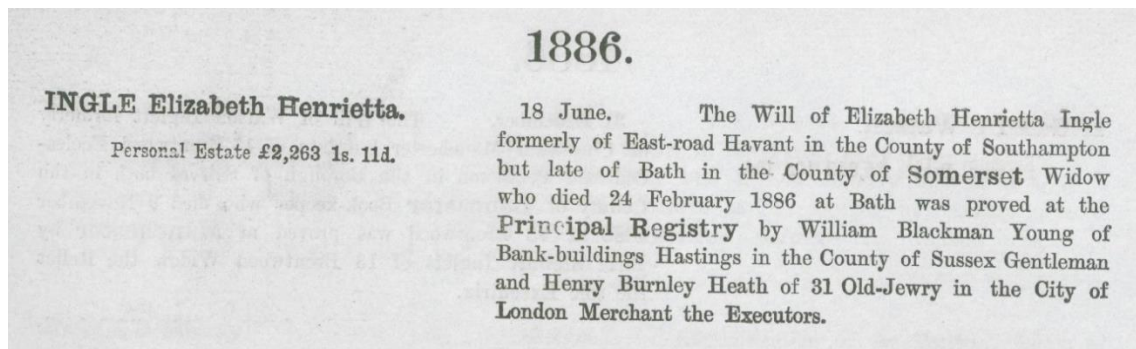
